What are Remote Supports?

Remote Support allows an off-site direct service provider to monitor

and respond to a person's health, safety, and other needs using live communication, while offering the person more independence in their home. Remote Support uses two-way communication in real time, just like Skype or FaceTime, so a person can communicate with their providers when they need them. Depending on the needs of the individual, this service can include additional equipment necessary for remote staff to assess safety in the home such as cameras, sensors, security systems, door locks, thermostats, etc.

Assistive Technology to Try

Lightweight headphones for both adults and children. Cozy Phones (available at Amazon) are perfect for individuals who might find other kinds of headphones uncomfortable or too heavy. Great for active lifestyles and easy to sleep in. These are not noise canceling headphones, but are Bluetooth compatible.
