Clinton County Solid Waste Management District - Classroom Presentations -

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The primary purpose of the Clinton County Solid Waste Management District is to increase waste reduction through the practice of recycling. As one way of achieving this mission, the Solid Waste District offers education and awareness presentations for all grade levels. Each presentation begins with a focus on giving accurate recycling information on *local recycling opportunities*, and then continues with more details and activities that are grade-level appropriate. These *free* classroom presentations aid in meeting standardized testing outcomes and we believe you will find they fit into your curriculum.

Listed below are the presentations for middle school and high school students, along with the correlating **Revised** Academic Content Standards met for Science and Social Studies as it pertains to Ohio's New Learning Standards.

Sixth Grade

<u>Trading Resources</u> – A great review for learning the factors of production. Students are divided into five groups, each group representing a country. Each group "manufactures" the same product (a paper chain composed of 5 links). Some countries have abundant resources while other countries do not. The groups must trade for the resources they need to make the sample product. Each student receives a recycled-content prize. About 45 minutes.

Seventh or Eighth Grade

 <u>Earth Jeopardy</u> – After being divided into four groups, the students participate in a take-off of the popular TV game show Jeopardy. A pre-discussion will cover various environmental topics and some ways we impact the environment. Through this activity, students continue to develop appropriate listening skills, teamwork and concentration skills. Students receive a recycled-content prize. About 45 minutes.

High School

• The Cost of Garbage - After an introduction and an explanation of who the Solid Waste District is, and what they do, the students learn the benefits of recycling and the hidden costs of landfilling waste. Students are asked to think about how decisions made today can impact them financially and environmentally for years to come. This presentation is done in a lecture and discussion format. Following the lecture, the class plays Earth Jeopardy. Each student receives a recycled-content prize. Allow 45 minutes.

Note: We generally do the *Recycle or No Recycle* program with 9th and 10th grade students, and then follow up with *The Cost of Garbage* with the 11th and 12th grade students. But, we will work with the teachers to ensure that the students do not get the same presentation two years in a row.
